


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ACT I:

The Snowman

Staged by Claire Jones,
Adapted from Raymond Briggs' Original Story

Synopsis

A young boy wakes on a snowy winter morning and ventures outside to build a snowman. The falling snow aids in this endeavor as he creates his masterpiece. After a long day of playing outside, he has a restless sleep as he senses the change occurring outside; his creation is coming to life. In the middle of the night, he goes back outside and discovers the Snowman, who gives a friendly greeting. A beautiful cardinal joins in the fun as they dance and play together before the boy invites the Snowman inside his home. Once inside, the Snowman meets the family house cat, discovers fire and the effect it has on him, and even gets to admire and play with some of the family's Christmas tree ornaments.

Upon returning the ornaments to the tree, the boy takes the Snowman up to his room where they are greeted by two beautiful ballerinas from the boy's music box. Entranced by their grace and beauty, all four dance together, while other objects in the boy's room stir and come to life. The Snowman meets the boy's collection of tin soldiers and teddy bears, and gets to play with some bright balloons left over from a party.

Once the balloons have settled, the Snowman decides it's time to show the boy HIS world outside. Back in the yard, a magical wind blows and takes the boy and Snowman to a forest clearing where they enjoy a jazzy Christmas party with new snowmen friends who are celebrating through different forms of dance.

After the party, the wind takes them to different countries around the world where other seasonal celebrations are taking place. The first destination is that of India, where they observe a community partaking in Diwali, the Festival of Lights. The Snowman and boy learn that Diwali celebrates the triumph of light over dark, and good over evil with blessings of victory, freedom, and enlightenment.

Next, they come upon a family in Israel dancing the Hava Nagila, a popular

variation of the Jewish Hora dance, often performed during festivities for major celebrations and holidays like Hanukkah. And finally, they visit West Africa, where they observe traditional dance forms that are a part of the culture that inspired the creation of Kwanzaa, meant to honor the ancestors and traditions of African Americans.

Upon leaving West Africa, the wind helps the Snowman take the boy home. Once back, the boy goes inside and finally gets a restful night's sleep, dreaming of all the other winter celebrations and of the new friends he made along the way.

In the morning, the boy is excited to continue the previous night's fun with his Snowman. However, upon going outside, all he finds is his cardinal friend from the previous evening. They dance together, enjoying each other's company before the boy goes back inside with his family.

Synopsis

For the second half of our evening, we enter The Nutcracker story mid-way through, joining Clara in an extravagant and colorful dream. Before we arrived, Clara had been enjoying a fabulous party hosted by her parents on Christmas Eve for friends and family. During the party, Clara's mysterious and magical Uncle Drosselmeyer gifted her with a majestic Nutcracker doll, which became the inspiration for Clara's dream. At the party's conclusion, Clara drifted off to sleep in the main parlor, holding her Nutcracker doll. Clara's dream began with her Nutcracker coming to life and battling a 7-headed Rat King. The entire room seemed to grow around her, and she watched in wonder as the other toys and dolls awakened to battle the Rat King's subjects. Clara aided her Nutcracker by throwing her shoe at the Rat King's head, distracting him and helping the Nutcracker vanquish his foe. The Nutcracker transformed into a handsome Cavalier and accompanied Clara through a sparkling snowy landscape before reaching his home, the Land of the Sweets.

This is where we have entered, joining Clara, the Nutcracker Cavalier, the Sugar Plum Fairy, the Flower Queen, and the rest of the subjects as they welcome Clara to their land. The Nutcracker tells everyone the story of how he battled the Rat King and came to life with Clara's help, and of their journey there. After the Nutcracker and Clara have been awarded for their bravery, Clara and the Sugar Plum Fairy take a seat on the throne and watch the subjects perform for them. During the performances, Clara decides to join in the fun and dance with the energetic Trepak and alongside the magical Flowers.

At the end of the night, all subjects come together for one final dance, during which Clara returns home before she awakes, safe and sound with her remarkable Nutcracker doll.



Justin Rustle


